Let's begin by stating what is obvious to data processing professionals: Using fourth-generation language technology means being able to code faster and to develop code of a better quality. And that means that a programmer can be better equipped to tackle the applications backlog that plagues so many data processing departments.

What may not be so obvious is that a fourth-generation language actually gets technology out of the way, and this phenomenon is transforming the entire information processing industry.

No longer is it necessary for a programmer to worry about translating the user's requirements into terms that the old software tools could understand. The programmer can now concentrate more fully on the needs and requirements of the end user.

Along with fourth-generation languages come all the latest software developments in information management: the micro-to-mainframe links like NATURAL/
CONNECTION, the menu-driven front-ends like SUPER NATURAL, and the office application solutions like CON-NECT. With technology "out of the way," data processing professionals and end users are actually moving close together. The programmer becomes in a sense a "systems analyst" and the end users becomes a "programmer".

We have learned many important lessons as we have moved through our short programming history from assembler language, to COBOL, and on to such advanced fourth-generation languages as NATURAL.

Making effective use of computing power no longer requires expertise in the use of the tools themselves—the tools only ease the way to developing information processing solutions. And, the future value of programmers will depend on how well they face the increasing challenge to understand the business decisions that end-users must make on a day-to-day basis. And, the success of organizations will depend on how effectively and efficiently they take on the challenge on managing information.

BWIA INTERNATIONAL AIRWAYS PRAISES SOFTWARE AG PRODUCTS, SUPPORT

When you're a small airline head-quartered on a remote Caribbean island, product reliability and vendor support become major factors in the selection of systems software. Those are just two of the reasons why Software AG of North America, Inc. has been the vendor of choice since 1981 for BWIA International, Trinidad & Tobago's National Carrier.

Like most airlines, BWIA relies heavily on computerized data base systems for everything from passenger reservations to equipment maintenance to management decision making. The difference is that BWIA has brought many of these systems up in a short time, and from a standing start (replacing manual procedures)— with a minimum of on-site assistance.

Using Software AG's ADABAS and NATURAL, BWIA has made a fast, smooth transition to a state-of-the-art DBMS approach. As a result, the company has been able to respond quickly and positively to changes in operating conditions, regulations, and competitive pressures—while simultaneously upgrading its fleet and improving overall financial performance during the period the systems have been in use.

DBMS Systems as strategic tools

According to company spokesman Martin Horsford, BWIA was the first user of ADABAS and NATURAL in the Caribbean. "At

the time we installed the products, there was no one else in the region to look to for guidance or reassurance. And of course, we're not just in the Caribbean, but at the far end of the Caribbean in terms of support from an American vendor. "But since we made the decision, we've never had any reason to look back. Product reliability has been excellent, and support has worked out well despite our remote location. Best of all, having these products has helped us turn our information systems into important strategic resources for the company.

"More and more, we're moving towards the development of systems that everyone from the Managing Director on down can use right on their desks. And with lots of PC users scattered in different departments, we're looking at ways to tie them all together so everybody gets the most benefit from the available resources."

"After all, it's the end users who are driving our growth —not just in data processing but throughout the company. If we can help the Managing Director by giving him information in graphic form right away rather than three or four

days later, ultimately it's going to help all of us."

Programmers prefer NATURAL

BWIA's current applications include several bought from outside vendors as well as those developed internally. As a result, says Horsford, the programming workload contains a mix of COBOL and Assembler as well as NATURAL, Software AG's popular fourth-generation language.

"Generally speaking, we've dealt pretty well with this combination. The only problem has been that once programmers learn NATURAL, they don't want to go back to the others. And there's no question, NATURAL does increase programming productivity by a significant margin.

"Another helpful thing about NATURAL is its integration with the other Software AG products. We don't have a big department, so most people have to do many different things.

Having a common syntax makes it a lot easier for people to move from one application to another."

From "pilot" project to user-group pioneer

BWIA's initial ADABAS application involved the conversion of a batch revenue accounting system. Today, many of that system's functions are handled online, including information on schedules, passenger volume by routes and rate classifications, and other regional marketing information.

All told, ADABAS and NATURAL have proved so easy to work with that BWIA now considers the ease of interfacing with ADABAS a top priority in the selection of future application software packages.

Concludes Horsford: "When we started out, we were pioneers. But now we've become a kind of regional elder statesman on behalf of ADABAS and NATURAL. With so many other people now using Software AG products in the Caribbean, it may be time to be pioneers again—by starting our very own regional users' group."

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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Strategic thinking has consistently been the hallmark of successful endeavors. Business goals and departmental plans are linked by common organizational objectives and must be in line with overall direction. Recently, the company I work for formalized the objectives of its data processing effort with a formal automation strategy. Not surprisingly, the corner stone of this effort was a data base strategy. This recognizes the maturing of data base technology and the emergence of data as an economic resource of the corporation.

It should also come as no surprise to anyone that ADABAS and NATURAL and PREDICT will continue to be the products we use to implement our future system.

The power and stability of these products has been demonstrated for our environment and we are looking toward capitalizing on existing applications, as we provide new automation and information to the business sectors.

The current challenge is to stick with a strategy in the face of constant pressure to change. The number of products that are just right for a specific project but not part of our current repertoire is staggering. We have numerous pockets of expertise in products that are not integrated within our systems. These become isolated and yet the function they provide is valuable. They must be accommodated. The number of ways to integrate PCs with their larger cousins is a megadigit number. Yet without the glue of central data these too are isolated. Because users have had a taste of data processing they have increased sophistication and knowledge and are not content to accept the wisdom of the data processing department without at least suggesting alternative methods of development.

All of this means we must be patient. We must continue to explain why we do things, in addition to seeking better alternatives. In talking to users we must show them how new designs meet their needs and also contribute to strategic unity.

In our own corporations, as well as in the Users' Group, strategic directions and operational objectives are melded into a sometimes cacophonous symphony of ideas. Only with patience, tenacity, and rationality can strategic decisions be orchestrated without discarding innovation and harmony. Participation in the Users' Group lends the support that comes in knowing others are confronting the same issues.

The way to maximize the benefit to yourself and your organization is to become involved. Present a paper at the next Regional meeting on something that will start discussion. Write an article on how these and other issues are being dealt with at your company. Start now to prepare a presentation for the 15th International Software AG Users' Conference. It is by active and open exchange that we help ourselves and each other.

VMS SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP FORMS

Daniel Nolan Heuristic Developments

At the Nashville Users' Conference, the first meeting of Software AG's International Users' Group ADABAS/NATURAL (VMS) Special Interest Group (SIG) for the DEC/VAX line of compact mainframes was formed. After presentations by Dr. Herbert Fischer, Software AG, Darmstadt, and Mr. David Keller, Software AG of North America, Inc., separate meetings totaling over three hours were held. This established that large data base management systems technology could be applied successfully on alternative equipment IBM users were surprised to find that the VMS Group was ahead in many areas and many were encouraged to gain insight into future releases of ADABAS and NATURAL by visiting their nearest VMS installation.

This SIG formally establishes a framework within the present International Software AG Users' Group that will serve to promote the use of this technology through communication, education and the sharing of experiences.

Several informal resolutions were presented and agreed upon by the participants at the users' conference. These include:

- Because the experience of relational DBMS lies almost entirely within the IBM ADABAS/ NATURAL user community, meetings will be scheduled around this activity. This will allow VMS users to reap the rewards of the past without repeating the errors.
- 2. Meetings will coincide with local and regional SAGGROUP meetings. Because the technical interests are so diverse in the two environments, Regional Representatives are being urged to arrange their agendas so that both IBM and VMS users can share common interests and yet separate and discuss hardware and system specific topics.
- 3. Although there are dramatic distinctions between VMS hardware configurations (standalone, coupled, etc.) and software applications (engineering, business, etc.), the SIG should not separate further. By keeping together, the VMS group will be able to reinforce their needs and will benefit from an even broader exposure to alternative methods.
- 4. A DBA Tools tape of unsupported user-generated utilities will be maintained and provided to the members at cost of material. Postpaid packaging and the tape will be included with each request. Contributions and requests (including the Software AG customer ID) should be addressed to: Dan Nolan, VMS SIG Chairman Heuristic Developments 7708 Newcastle Drive Annandale, Virginia 22003
- A bulletin board facility will be provided over dialup communications to all VMS users. This will include each users' profile and the ability to communicate on a time-delayed basis. Those wishing to subscribe to this service should phone for details to 703/644-3100 (or 703/642-9333 after hours).
- The bulletin board and phone calls to me will constitute an Application Trouble Desk. This will allow those who are faced with unfamiliar projects to discuss the work others have done in similar areas.
- 7. Communications being one of the most important vehicles in our industry, the SIG agreed to emphasize participation and office in local regions. The opportunity to present papers locally as a rehearsal for the next International Software AG Users' Conference should produce no fewer than six presentations in next year's San Diego conference agenda.

Also, papers, contributions and local activities related to VMS products that are presented at SIG meetings will be submitted to Software AG for publication. Dan Nolan set the pace by presenting the decisions that led to Heuristic Developments' decision to move its ADABAS/NATURAL product line and development work onto the VMS products.

After this initial organization, work began in earnest: Mike Schowalter and Dr. Fischer fielded technical discussions from the attendees. Such a wide scope of topics were to be covered, and so intense was the interest that the alloted time was exhausted. A special session was held after the regular session day had ended which allowed all questions, answers and recommendations to be heard and passed on.

The first regional meeting was held in Washington, DC on July 16, 1985 in conjunction with the Eastern Region. Tom Clark, the Regional Representative, agreed to structure the agenda so that items of mutual interest to IBM and VMS users could be heard in the morning. In the afternoon the VMS contingent adjourned to a separate room for their VMS technical session (see article titled, "VMS Special Interest Group Holds First Meeting", under the Regional Reports section of this newsletter).

NEW CHANGE/ ENHANCEMENT PROCEDURES

Martin Henderson Marathon Oil Company

There has been some confusion over the modifications the SAGGROUP Executive Committee made to the Change/Enhancement (C/E) process at the Nashville Users' Conference. To clear up the confusion, let me outline the major points for you.

- A. There will be no voting on the C/E's prior to the users' conference each year.
- B. Software AG will provide their responses to the C/E's after every calendar quarter (January, April, July, and October).
- C. In June, the user community will receive a list of all C/E's that were submitted from April of the previous year to March of the current year. They will then vote only on the C/E's that are classified as Future Objective, Under Study, Long Range Consideration, or Rejected. C/E's that are classified as Available, Announced, or Accepted will not be voted on. Your completed ballots should be mailed to the C/E Coordinator by August and the results of the voting to be mailed to the user community in September.

Those are the major changes that have been made to the C/E process. Previously, when a C/E was submitted, it could take up to a year and a half to receive a response from Software AG. This was due to the schedule of events designed into the C/E process. One goal I have had was to reduce that time down to four months (about once a quarter). It is obvious that it is impossible to have the international user community vote and obtain Software AG responses once every four months. The SAGGROUP Executive Committee decided at the 1985 Nashville Users'

Conference that it is more important to receive Software AG responses on a timely basis. The user community will then vote on the C/E's AFTER Software AG has given their responses and AFTER the international users' conference each year. There are two advantages to this new approach:

- 1. The user community will receive responses to their C/E's every four months;
- The user community will no longer vote on C/E's that have Software AG responses of Accepted, Announced, or Available. The user community can, therefore, concentrate their votes on the more relevant C/E's.

For the years 1985 through 1986, you should keep the following dates in mind:

- You should receive a list of C/E's with Software AG responses in the following months - January, April, July, and October;
- All the C/E's (with Software AG responses) from September 1984 through December 1985 will be included in the 1986 International Software AG Users' Conference Proceedings. Each conference attendee will then have a list of the C/E's to read over and discuss at the conference C/E sessions;
- 3. In June of 1986, you should receive C/E's to vote on. These C/E's were submitted from September 1984 through December 1985;
- 4. You must return your voting ballots to the C/E Coordinator by August 15, 1986;
- You should then receive the voting results in September 1986.

I hope this will clear up the confusion. If you have any questions, please contact me directly.

The new procedures have been implemented for the Change/Enhancement system, but they are a little behind schedule. We are attempting to provide the user community with responses to their Change/Enhancements (C/E's) every calendar quarter. You were supposed to receive the first responses in July 1985. It looks like you will receive those responses late for this quarter. One reason for the delay is the number of Change/Enhancements received so far. The "first quarter" was from September 1984 through June 1985. We had 48 C/E's for COM-PLETE, 47 for ADABAS, 12 for PREDICT, and 133 for NATURAL. This is close to the total number of C/E's submitted for the entire year of 1985.

The number of C/E's that I have received since the Users' Conference in Nashville has dramatically dropped. For the months of July through September, I expected to receive about 50 C/E's for all products. I hope to have the initial problems straightened out by the third quarter of 1985.

I will be attending the mid-year meeting of the SAGGROUP Executive Committee in October in Reston. At that time I will be reporting on the progress of the new system and discussing any possible changes or improvements. One improvement that I am considering is the development of a NATURAL/CONNECTION program for entering the initial C/E's. A company could then use their PC for entering C/E's, and once a quarter they could mail me a diskette.

The purpose of the Change/Enhancement System is to provide a mechanism where the Software AG user community can provide information to Software AG on improving their product. This is a very important function and it deserves to be treated seriously. Almost all users of Software AG products will come into contact with the C/E process at one time or another. I have made some changes to the C/E process in order to improve the communication between Software AG and the user community. I have been in this position for almost two years and it is time for someone to take my place as the Change/Enhancement Coordinator at the San Diego Users' Conference next year. If you are interested in the responsibilities of this highly visible position, please contact me. If you have any suggestions to improve the Change/Enhancement Systems, please contact me as well.

VMS SPECIAL INTEREST GROUP HOLDS FIRST MEETING

Daniel Nolan Heuristic Developments

On July 16, 1985, the VMS Special Interest Group attended as an adjunct to the regular Eastern Region SAGGROUP meeting. The first part of this session, common to both VAX and IBM sites, focused on the topic of performance.

The results of this topic included the "Ten Most Common Problems" and their respective solutions as described by Steve Carter from Data Base Utility Group:

Some additional ideas were presented including:

- Try to match data access paths with record selection. (Appropriately use FIND, READ LOGICAL, READ PHYSICAL, etc. Use the FIND ... BUT NOT ... to further reduce selections.)
- Avoid redundant processing loops. (Too often, FINDs nested in other loops get the same record.)
- Recognize overhead of sequencing. (Alternatives to SORTED are READ LOGICAL and external SORT)
- 4. Process MU and PE fields appropriately. (Where GET SAME is expensive, OBTAIN and MOVE INDEXED costs less, while direct reference by index number is cheap. OBTAIN when not indexing, however, is wasteful. Implicit ranges, such as ADD #EARNINGS = SALARY (1-12) is good. The value of elaborate code to avoid necessary access is generally questionable.)
- Structure UPDATE processing logic rationally, so as not to include records and files in an UPDATE that are not changed.
- Watch the overall program structure to avoid unneeded work that could "linger" from development and experimentation.
- 7. Use RETAIN sets, both to pass series of records from one program to another, and to reduce the overhead of complex FINDs (but check the *NUMBERs before doing the final FIND).
- Avoid trying to enforce standards with parameters. (Reducing LS will not encourage use of FIND ...SORTED. Selection is done outside LS, and a tiny LS will increase the number of throwbacks.)
- Employ object module analysis (such as distributed by the Rocky Mountain Region) or source code standard scanners to intercept problems before production.

During discussion from the floor, some examples of "clear programming" were cited. The premise is that "Bad" code is never intentionally put in a program. It survives by disguise, hiding and camouflage. Programmers either use excessive "Noise Words" or omit them altogether. While too many words can tend to camouflage (and aggravate) too few words will often mislead by hiding:

- REINPUT WITH TEXT 'Enter Date' MARK FIELD 1 AND SOUND ALARM
 ... is probably too wordy when compared with; REINPUT 'Enter Date' ALARM
 ... and, considering that the users will appreciate a more verbose complete message, you can re-invest the space saved as; REINPUT 'Effective Date Must Be Year, Month & Day' ALARM
- 2. FIND ALL RECORDS IN FILE PERSONNEL WITH NAME = 'ADAM' THRU 'ADAM' vs. FIND PERSONNEL WITH NAME = 'ADAM'
- 3. READ PERSONNEL WITH NAME = 'ADAM' ... gives no indication that it doesn't stop there; READ PERSONNEL BY NAME STARTING FROM 'ADAM' ... gives a better idea of what is going to happen, while; READ PERSONNEL BY NAME IN LOGICAL SEQUENCE FROM 'ADAM' ... leaves no doubt whatsoever.
- READ PERSONNEL WITH SEX = 'M'
 WHERE NAME = 'ADAM'
 ... clear as to intent, this combines statements;
 READ PERSONNEL WITH SEX = 'M'
 WHERE NAME = 'ADAM'
 ... placing separate statements on separate
 lines makes the meaning clearer and reveals
 logic.
- 5. SEX = 'M'

 \dots standing alone, will put the letter 'M' in the field. Let's look at the program;

0220 READ PERSONNEL
0230 UPDATE WITH SALARY =
SALARY (0090)
0240 * IF SEX = ' '
0250 SEX = 'M'
0260 PERFORM WRITE-LIST

... and the entire staff of the company is masculated by maintenance. Always use the words ASSIGN or COMPUTE.



6. READ PERSONNEL
OBTAIN SALARY (1-64)
IF SALARY (1) = 0 PERFORM NEW-HIRE
CLOSE LOOP

... will result in an "inexplicable" runtime error if there is insufficient format buffer space to contain all the values along with the rest of the program. At the lease, the OBTAIN is wasted since it is never used.

Other asides and comments in the audience stressed the importance of indentation, comments and meaningful field names in programs. Typically, the frustrations of simply getting the program to satisfy the End-Users will prevent developers from reviewing their code with the eye toward efficiency that casual observers might provide, given that they can make it through the verbage.

After a short break, the VMS Special Interest Group met as a separate group to discuss their specific interests. Dan Nolan, Heuristic Developments, began by distributing the DBA Tools tape for VMS users and explained each of the facilities. A point of significance. The DBA Tools do not replace Software AG features, but serve only as Stop-Gap, Standard and Guides When Software AG incorporates a feature that performs the work that is on the DBA Tools, that feature will be removed from the tape.

Dan also included the single-format "file" or "communications" transfer program he developed to move applications between VAX and IBM. This program, installable on either machine, writes or installs code in a single format. Standardization at this level releases installers from concern over the type of machine involved in producing or installing applications. Tapes cut from one machine can be used on either machine

VMS users have benefitted from the experience of the IBM contingent in the establishment of the first true DBMS on their compact mainframes. In return, Big Iron people can gain expertise from the VAX users on the coming release of ADABAS V5 and NATURAL V2 for the IBM.

FAR EAST REGION

Masaki Oshima Software AG of Far East, Inc.

The general meeting for the Far East Region was held on June 25, 1985 in Tokyo with 109 attendees.

Mr. Amino, a committee member of the Users' Group, gave an address to the participants with an outline of the activities and events in the previous fiscal year, 1984.

Mr. Keiji Ueda of Nissan Motor Co., Ltd. was reelected as President of the Users' Group and also the Software AG Far East Regional Representative. New committee members nominated by the executive committee members met. The activities and the balance of the previous fiscal year were reported. The activity plans for this year were accepted with unanimous approval.

In the former half of the general meeting, Professor Tadanobu Tsunoda of Tokyo Medical and Dental College, gave a speech titled as "The activity of the brain and environment." It was a very interesting speech. □

FAR EAST REGION ASSIGN

The 43rd ASSIGN was held in Tokyo on June 25, 1985 with 75 attendees.

I reported on the policy of Software AG which was presented at the recent 14th International Software AG Users' Conference in Nashville and on my impression of the conference Mr. Ishizaka of Software AG Far East introduced the concept of an integrated approach including Office Automation, called Fourth Generation Information Technology.

Mrs. Yoshiki of Software AG Far East reported on the answers to the annual Change/Enhancement Requests submitted by the Far East users.

Finally, Mr. Shimada of Software AG Far East gave a presentation on ADABAS Version 5.1. \square

THE 16TH COM-PLETE USERS' GROUP MEETING

The 16th COM-PLETE Special Interest Group meeting was held at the Tokyo Norin Nenkin Kaikan after the Far East Region Users' Group meeting of June 25, 1985.

Mr. Suemasu of Software AG Far East reported about the 14th International Users' Conference and Mr. Katada of Tokyo Sanguo Shinkin Bank gave his impressions of the conference.

The theme of study in this fiscal year was discussed and it was decided to continue the study of "Library Management" with all of the members. Further, it was decided that some lectures and other meetings related to the leading technology of data communications would be held.

A new member, Mr. Suzuki of Dentsu Inc. joined the COM-PLETE group and introduced himself to the members.

Mr. Furuyama of Software AG Far East gave a presentation on COM-PLETE V4.3.1 and Japanese ZEDIT V2.1.

SOUTH EAST ASIA USERS MEET

Pearly Lim Republic of Singapore

The annual meeting of South East Asia users was held on March 28-29, 1985 at the Institute of Systems Science in Singapore. Sixty-six people from 13 of the 18 South East Asia user organizations attended. In addition, six SPL and Software AG of North America staff were present along with eight users from Hong Kong, Philippines and Malaysia.

Ms Pearly Lim, Ministry of Finance, began the two-day program with a presentation on their first experience in program walkthrough on three NATURAL programs. Allen Leung, Dow Chemical, Hong Kong, followed with an overview of their ADABAS environment. The Ministry of Defense gave two presentations. Lim Khee Meng and Mark Tan talked on the facility they developed to download data from the mainframe to the IBM PC. The attendees were all enlightened on this innovative development process.

On the second day, Lee Kian Joo and Angela Lim talked on their experience in implementing a successful information center environment using ADABAS and NATURAL. The Port of Singapore Authority gave two talks. Ho Shew Ee presented their utility to cross-reference NATURAL programs; Kwan Swee Wah told the group how they document and control the ADABAS command flow in their environment, A facility developed for online job booking under CICS and TSO was presented by Koh Kim Tian of the Ministry of Education. The Institute of Systems Science (ISS) concluded the meeting with two very interesting presentations. Bill Zernik gave a condensed talk on a one-week course on the ISS data design methodology as it applies to ADABAS. This was followed by Por Hau Joo presenting the NATURAL Flowcharting Technique he compiled and developed.

The attendees were treated to a feast of vendor presentations. As SPL had just been appointed as their new representative, Teng Cheng Chong, General Manager of SPL, Singapore, and David Needham, Director of SPL Australia, gave us their view from the vendors stand point. Teng Cheng Chong also gave a briefing on the Training Plan. This was followed by Randy Mangum, Technical Support, Software AG of North America, who briefed the group on the support plan. Mike Dunkerlay, Senior Technical Support Representative of SPL Australia, gave an overview of ADABAS/VTAM and reflective data bases. This was followed by David Needham telling about some interesting Australian users experiences. Mike Gallagher, Product Marketing Manager from Software AG of North America, presented CON-NECT, Software AG's plans for office systems. Mike Dunkerlay concluded the first day's meeting with a talk on five parameters related to ADABAS tuning. On the second day, Mike Gallagher talked on enhancements to existing Software AG products, future directions of Software AG and demonstrated SUPER NATURAL

The consensus of the attendees found the meeting to be very worthwhile. The National Computer Board and SPL were thanked for their sponsorship of the meeting. $\hfill\Box$

NORTHWEST REGION

Steve Bradley Weyerhaeuser Company

The major topic of the September 6 meeting was Dictionary Development and Usage.

The first presentation was by Alan Shue, Manus Professional Services. Alan discussed data dictionary concepts with the main emphasis being that information is and should be a managed resource within any company. He discussed the concepts of metadata (data in the dictionary about your corporate data), types of metadata that might be kept (hardware, application software, operating software, digital data, and hardcopy data), dictionary configuration modes (passive, active, inline), and metadata models.

Alan characterized part of his presentation as being "where the rubber meets the sky". Some of it did appear to be out in the future, but maybe not as far as one might think. Some of it is here now.

Dean Sales, Software AG, Mountain View was up next with a presentation on PREDICT 2 and its new features and functions. Cathy Lonsdale followed with some tidbits about current and new releases and training. She asked each site present to fill out a Customer Profile form so that we would have the latest information about each customer site and contacts.

Larry Jayne, Users' Group Liaison, Software AG, talked about the newsletter, gave an update about the last users' conference and the plans underway for the next conference. He discussed the changes to the Change/Enhancement procedure and reviewed the list of consultants which is available to each user.

Next was a panel of users who discussed various dictionary environments found among the Northwest SAGGROUP members.

Steve Baker, Multnomah County, started off by telling about his shop's use of PREDICT. They use if for file definitions and for NATURAL DDMs. Steve seemed happy with their use of PREDICT and encouraged others to get PREDICT off the shelf and into use.

Mike Stein represented Washington Data Processing Service Center #1 serving several state agencies. Each agency has a DBA for their database(s). The service center has Datamanager and the old Software AG dictionary. They also have PREDICT, and are bringing it up. Mike said they recognize there will likely be a need to support multiple dictionaries and build bridges between them.

Bill Anderson, Washington Department of Labor and Industries, described experiences with home-grown dictionaries. Bill had worked with the home-grown variety at a previous employer.

Debby Lawson, Washington State University, described their experiences with four different dictionary packages over several years.

From the discussion, it seems that PREDICT is being successfully used for maintaining ADABAS file definitions and NATURAL DDMs. Very few shops are using any dictionary for much beyond file definitions and DDMs. And some shops are not using any dictionary at all.

Mike Gilliam, Software AG, Denver, followed the panel discussions with a review of some technical hints that he had pickup during his work in the Denver Customer Support Center.

PACIFIC SOUTHWEST REGION

Gary Hart CCH Computax

The July 26 meeting was hosted by CCH Computax in El Segundo, California. Mark Ambrose, Ticor Mortgage, received a letter from Lope Auxillos of the Asian Development Bank in the Philippines offering to share a group of his NATURAL utilities. The "Kendrick Utilities", as he calls them, include material from Lope's two presentations at the last two International Software AG Users' Conferences, a NATURAL object editor, and many other NATURAL utilities. Gary Hart, CCH Computax, said he will order the tape and will make it available to other local users.

Gary Hart talked about the creation of a local user's group porfile. Member information sheets were distributed to those in attendance.

The meeting concluded with an on-line demonstration by Gary Hart, on some DBA tools that use the ADAREP reports. Information is generated on added extents, blocks used, file growth and more.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN WEST REGION

The first meeting of the newly formed Rocky Mountain West Region was held on July 12, 1985 at the Utah Retirement Systems office in Salt Lake City, Utah. This region was formerly part of the Rocky Mountain Region which was split into two regions, the Rocky Mountain West and the Rocky Mountain East.

The first presentation was prepared by Art Daniels and presented by Kent Linsenman of EG & G Idaho, Inc. This presentation was titled, "From 'Homegrown' To PREDICT Utilizing User Exits." EG & G had developed a quite extensive online data dictionary system prior to the release of PREDICT. This presentation dealt with how they have used PREDICT's user exits to give PREDICT some of the additional functionality that they had come to rely on for dictionary integrity and interface capability under their "homegrown" system. Kent stated that the major advantage of PREDICT over their own system was the migration facility for dictionary elements between data bases. This and the necessity to stay compatible with future releases of Software AG products were the primary reasons for converting from their "homegrown" system to PREDICT.

Mike Ater, Vice President of Customer Service, Software AG, followed with a discussion on Customer Service, Policies and Directions, previous service, current service, and what Software AG is striving for in these areas.

After a short break, Mary Muldoon from Software AG gave an excellent slide presentation on PREDICT V2 and NATURAL CONNECTION V2. Mary demonstrated the new features and answered questions regarding the two products.

Janie Gilbert of EG & G Idaho, concluded the meeting with a presentation titled, "System Architecture - A Common Architecture For Integrated Business Systems." Systems Architecture is an umbrella software application developed and used by EG & G Idaho to integrate various business systems at a processing system level. Similar automated functions, such as, data validation, error handling, etc. are performed by the System Architecture in conjunction with the application program rather than each application performing this work itself. The objective of System Architecture was that to any online business system end user, the applications were to look the same, act the same and report the same. It also made it easier for programmers to move from one application group to another, because they were all utilizing the same architecture.

SOUTHEASTERN REGION

Ralph Kindred R. J. Reynolds

The September 11, 1985 meeting began with the election of new officers. Ralph Kindred from R. J. Reynolds was elected Regional Representative. Jim Obenschain from the Environmental Protection Agency was elected Regional Vice President and Clayton Clendinen from Orlando Utilities Commission was elected Regional Secretary. Next, Larry Jayne, Software AG Users' Group Liaison, let us know about changes and plans in the Software AG Users' Group and about next years international users' conference planned in San Diego.

John Osteen a consultant with Database Design & Management presented the topic Database Administration and the Data Dictionary Function, and used PREDICT as the data dictionary in his discussion.

Doug Martin from Price Waterhouse gave a presentation on Resource Management in an End User Environment. His discussion included the topics of access management, performance management and capacity planning.

Dennis Gandy of Software AG talked about CON-NECT, one of Software AG's newest products.

SOUTHWEST REGION

Mike Jones
Telex Computer Products, Inc.

The September 13 meeting began with a review of the proposed by-laws for the region. They were approved as proposed. The regular round-table discussion followed with each attendee mentioning his name and organization. Also, each attendee was encouraged to ask the group a technical question related to Software AG products to which he hoped to obtain a solution while at the meeting. This has been used very successfully by the region as a method of sharing questions and concerns with the group and obtaining answers. Each attendee is limited to one minute so that everyone has a chance to express their question.

Following the round-table, Jim Thomann of Software AG's Educational Services Department discussed PREDICT Vers. 2 and its new features and functions.

James Kendrick, Arthur Young, gave an overview of a new technology called CAD/CAP being developed by Arthur Young in consultation with James Martin. The technology includes both PC and mainframe facilities to be used for computer assisted application design and development.

A discussion of educational services provided by DELTAK followed. Phil Arcker described the currently available ADABAS audio visual course and the soon to be available NATURAL CBT course.

ADABAS PRODUCT REP'S REPORT

A. C. Roda Planning Research Corporation

The big news in the ADABAS product area of course is the impending release of Version 5.1. Consequently, until users start installing the product and exercising the new features and options, there isn't much to say about Version 4.1; at least no one has sent me anything. It is a solid, mature, and proven product which has served us well. But it is definitely delivery time for Version 5.

I'd like a little feedback from non-NATURAL (unnatural?) users regarding Software AG's decision to no longer distribute and support ADASCRIPT+. I agree that NATURAL is definitely the way to go, but there may be cases where its use or purchase is a bit of overkill and hard to justify. There are users and potential users of ADABAS who only need, and in my opinion deserve, to have available to them, a DBMS with a simple no extra cost query language. Will Version 5 support Version 4 ADASCRIPT+ applications? I'll be looking into that and will report back what I find, in the next newsletter.

As a reminder, if you're converting to MVS/ XA, don't forget to obtain a new SVC from Software AG.

TUNING ADABAS IN THE CICS ENVIRONMENT

Edward Barrow Software AG

ADABAS performance in an online CICS environment first assumes that ADABAS is tuned well. That is to say that standard performance and tuning is done on the database with reasonable frequency in accordance with the Software AG "Performance and Tuning" class. Examples of this kind of tuning include: limited (if any) throwbacks or RSPO88's; less than 1% of all calls going through the last thread; the buffer efficiency (logical io vs. physical io) should be as high as possible; reduction in the number of interrupts; etc. (see "Performance and Tuning", Sue Karlin, 1983 International User's Conference.)

If DSTATS at the end of the day show that ADABAS is running efficiently and yet response time for online users is still unreasonably long, then the interplay of CICS and ADABAS should be considered.

In general we recommend at the outset that ADABAS run in a operating system priority that is at least equal to if not greater than the priority of the TP monitor.

The following information is specific to CICS:

- NT (from ADABAS) should be approximately equal to CMXT (from CICS)
- 2) NC (from ADABAS) should be greater than CMXT (from CICS) to account for batch processing against the nucleus also. If multiple CICS regions are processing against the same ADABAS nucleus then NC must be increased to account for the number of commands from each CICS region. Therefore: NC=> CMXT(R1) + CMXT(R2) + CMXT(R3) + ...+ CMXT (Rn) + BATCH

+CMXT(R3) + ...+ CMXT (Rn) + BATCH where R1, R2, R3, ..., Rn are CICS regions BATCH is the number of ADABAS calls from batch processing

- CMXT should be approximately equal to AMXT (from CICS SIT)
- 4) AMXT + N should be approximately equal to MXT (from CICS SIT) where N is a variable number of other NON-ADABAS tasks that CICS should perform.
- 5) TRNPRTY in CICS PCT for ADABAS can be set to favor ADABAS. The 'transaction processing priority' in CICS is the sum of TRNPRTY, the 'terminal priority' and the 'operator priority' (TRMPRTY and OPPRTY respectively).
- 6) The user can also manipulate the NUBS within ADALNC. NUBS is the number of user buffers that ADALNC can allocate from CICS. It is roughly equivalent to NC within ADABAS; therefore NC should be approximately equal to NUBS + M where M is a variable number of batch commands going against the ADABAS nucleus in addition to the online activity. This also implies that NC => NUBS since online use could dominate the nucleus to the extent that batch activity would see RSPO88s and high throwbacks.
- 7) The PPT entry for ADABAS should be near the top of the table entries for CICS. This will decrease the scan length during the PPT table locate by CICS. This table is searched each time an ADABAS call is made from a user in CICS. Please note: this is no longer true with versions of CICS after 1.6.1. IBM has changed the search algorithm to accommodate the most frequently used programs in the PPT.

The main theme in tuning the interaction between CICS and ADABAS is to let each piece of software do what is does best. CICS is far better equipped to handle the dispatching of tasks within the TP environment; allow it to 'pre-select' the ADABAS users as opposed to forcing ADABAS to undertake the constant monitoring of incoming commands. However, once the user's request has passed through the hierarchy of queues to reach ADABAS, ADABAS must have the resources available to it to fulfill the request.

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KENDRICK UTILITIES

Lope Auxillos Asian Development Bank

I have given presentations at the last two International Software AG Users' Conferences ("Keeping NATURAL Secure", at the 1984 conference in Los Angeles, and "Graphics the NATURAL Way" at the 1985 conference in Nashville). Since then, I have talked to a lot of people and have received lots of comments as well as exchanged many ideas. As a sort of gratitude to all of my friends in the ADABAS/ NATURAL circle, I am offering for free some of my most treasured utilities.

I have called them the "Kendrick Utilities" in honor of my partner in the Data Base Administration, Mr. Kendrick Ong, the guy with a special gift for cracking software and automating DBA utilities.

Just to mention a few, the utilities include a "switch" feature which allows you to go around all the NATURAL system files in your data base without having to "FIN" and get into another system file. All the source NATURAL programs of the Simple Security System we have developed are included and they are now in much better shape since when they first came out in 1984. We also have new NATURAL editor features like Calculator and Notepad which will pop out on top of your program (with your program still intact). They generally have these features on the PC, but now, you can have them on the mainframe. In addition, you can also execute NATURAL commands, programs, and modules from within the editor. Also included is a very much enhanced VERIFY utility. After much thinking, we have decided to release our prized NATURAL Object Editor, which has been requested by numerous installations. Some short documentation is included for all these utilities so you can familiarize yourself easily with their workings. There are no installations, no zaps or gimmicks, just plain unconventional programming. Kendrick Utilities will run under NATURAL V1.2 SM3 to SM6.

As the cost of sending tapes from Manila, Philippines is expensive (and we are also not that rich), we have initially sent the tape to Mr. Thomas R. TECHNIQUE OF THE QUARTER

Ted Venema Software AG of Canada

On occasion, especially if you are working with code generation, it is useful to get a B type variable into an N type variable in such a manner that the two variables print the same way. For example, if #BVAR(B2) = H '0120' and you assign #NVAR(N4) = #BVAR, then writing #NVAR will yield 288 which is the decimal equivalent of #BVAR. But, what if you wish to have #NVAR yield 120 so that it can be used in places where B type variables are not allowed such as the COMPRESS statement. If you are generating code that contains refer-backs to NATURAL line numbers then this type of thing occurs since NATURAL line numbers are not really 10, 20, 30 etc., but 16, 32, 64 printed in their hexadecimal format. The following short piece of code does this nicely, thanks to Mr. Gene Miklovich of Software AG of Canada.

0010 RESET #PACK(P5): REDEFINE #PACK (#PACK-LINE(B2))

0020 RESET #NVAR(N4) #BVAR(B2)

0030 REDEFINE #NVAR(#AVAR(A4))

0040 #BVAR = H'0120'

0050 #PACK-LINE = #BVAR / * overlay onto packed field,

0060 #PACK = #PACK / 10 /* shift right 1 position

0070 #NVAR = #PACK /* and unpack

0080 WRITE #BVAR #NVAR #AVAR

The WRITE statement in line 0080 will write the same value for all three variables with #AVAR yielding the exact character string.

TUNING NATURAL IN THE CICS ENVIRONMENT

Edward Barrow Software AG

Certain procedures can be followed to increase the performance of NATURAL in the CICS environment beyond the tuning of ADABAS.

- For pseudo-conversational users, the CISIZE parm should be as large as possible, up to a full track, for the VSAM auxiliary temp storage data set.
- 2) With the advent of NATURAL V1.2 (sm06) the NATURAL Buffer Pool Manager was introduced. Proper use of this NATURAL feature will insure that frequently used NATURAL programs, will stay in core thus dramatically reducing calls to ADABAS to load NATURAL modules. Information pertaining to and explaining the NATURAL Buffer Pool Manager can be found in the NATURAL SM06 Documentation:
- 3) If the NATURAL Buffer Pool Manager is not installed, then use of the NATPARM 'NSTATIC' will provide performance benefits. By using the parameter NSTATIC a NATURAL program can be unloaded from the NATURAL system file to a OS PDS or (DOS RELO library) to be subsequently linked to the NATURAL load library (or DOS RELO library) and finally INCLUDED in the relink of the online NATURAL load module (DOS phase). NSTATIC can also be used with the NATURAL Buffer Pool Manager but the increase in performance would be minimal although the NSTATIC link should always be considered for applications that must run or are always in use.
- 4) Manipulation of the TRNPRTY parameter of the NATURAL transaction can also increase performance. If CICS gives higher priority (TRNPRTY) to this transaction, then obviously NATURAL users will benefit.
- 5) Although 'vanilla' NATURAL is not directly influenced by the value of OSCORE (defined in the DFHSIT macro at CICS sysgen), this parameter setting is important as a tuning device within CICS. This parameter controls the amount of dynamic allocation area in the CICS region dedicated to needs of the operating system (specifically, the IO macros: OPEN and CLOSE) after CICS is initialized. If OSCORE is set too high, then when a pseudo-conversational NATURAL user tries to resume his session there may not be enough room in the CICS subpool to re-acquire the users' storage. This will cause a wait, or hang condition for the user until the space is freed up by another CICS task.

The emphasis here is that there must be enough subpool to accommodate the maximum CICS tasks if they happen to be all NATURAL pseudo-conversational users. If at any point in a pseudo session initialization, there isn't enough subpool to initialize, the user will get a NAT9997, not a hang or wait.

6) NATURAL also provides for the use of multiple NATPARM and NTSYS modules. CICS resource contention can be reduced by using alternate modules for specific tasks: e.g. if a group of users is never to be writing programs, then a large ESIZE is unnecessary. By decreasing the values for ESIZE (which contains the NATURAL source code during the editing and compiling) and FSIZE (which contains the global variable area and online sort areas at execution time) less data will be written to VSAM temp storage and less CICS subpool will be required to meet the users' request. An alternate NTSYS might be created which increases the ESIZE and FSIZE values for the programming staff.

This utilization of NTSYS and NATPARM can be especially useful in releases after SM06. At that point NATURAL began doing a 'compressed roll': attempting to place all used storage areas in a single Control Interval. If the storage areas are smaller, then the likelihood of compressing them all into a single Control Interval (and therefore a single IO) is increased.

In the sample NATPARM module that Software AG sends out to all users, there is an example of the standard NATPARM module as well as the NTSYS module 'A'. More confirmation on the creation of the NTSYS and NATPARM modules can be found in the NATURAL INSTALLATION manual (pg. 49 for the OS user and on page 59 for the DOS user).

7) Because NATURAL depends heavily upon the data base, correct NATURAL system file placement within ADABAS can also play a key role in improving performance. Along these lines, splitting NATURAL system information into multiple ADABAS files can increase performance by decreasing file contention. With releases after sm05, users are allowed to save dictionary data on one file (FDIC) and NATURAL system programs on another file (FNAT). Furthermore, user programs for each department can be split apart by implementing multiple FUSER files and NTSYS modules for each of the departments. This file separation allows for greater flexibility in the data base design for optimal utilization by a NATURAL system.

With this idea of data separation in mind, other ADABAS specific tuning ideas can be implemented. Since FNAT will contain only non-updatable system programs for NATURAL, it can be created with minimum padding factors for Associator and Data Storage. The same would be true for a FUSER in the production environment; programs in that file will probably not be changing but will be migrated to production from a test or development system. The production FUSER however will be a heavily used file and should therefore be placed in the data base to reflect this. A development FUSER should have a greater padding factor (the length of programs will change frequently) and file placement within the data base has less importance since fewer users will be accessing it.

Channel contention can be reduced (if each file resides on packs that are separated by channels); head movement is also reduced since the size of the sub-files is substantially less than the original system file.

8) The PPT and PCT entries for NATURAL should be near the top of the CICS table entries. This will decrease the scan length during the PPT and PCT locates. This scan is done every time that the <enter> key is hit in a pseudo-conversational session. Please note: this is no longer true with versions of CICS after 1.6.1. IBM has changes the search algorithm to accommodate the most frequently used programs in the PPT.

NATURAL/CONNECTION VER. 2 UPDATE

Wes Jenkins Congressional Budget Office

I have been testing version 2 of NATURAL/CONNECTION since August. The microcomputer software has been totally rewritten and offers many dramatic improvement over the first version of NATURAL/CONNECTION. I have written a paper that documents our experience with the new version and discusses how we plan to use it a the Congressional Budget Office. If you are interested in a copy of this paper, let me know your address and I will get one out to you as soon as possible.

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COM-PLETE PRODUCT REP'S REPORT

Ron G. Hoover Pennsylvania State University

I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who supported me during the recent election. It is my intention to represent COM-PLETE users to the best of my ability. To accomplish this, I need to be aware of your interests and needs. From reading past newsletters, it appears product rep's have had difficulty soliciting information from users. I would hope this is not the case with COM-PLETE users. Please take time to drop me a line or call on the phone to let me know your interests and concerns. My mailing address and phone number are listed under the Executive Committee section of this newsletter. I am particularly interested in hearing about your experiences with the roll staging buffer. What have you tried that works and what has not? We have not been very successful with roll staging at Penn State because our threads are large, requiring a large buffer and causing increased paging.

Another area of interest is the NATURAL buffer pool facility. This facility has resulted in a 15 to 20 percent decrease in activity to our NATURAL systems file but at the expense of 1150K worth of buffer in COM-PLETE.

I look forward to hearing about your successes and failures with COM-PLETE. I will share your experiences with the user community and Software AG.

SAGGROUP EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE UPDATE

Carlo A. Scagnelli SAGGROUP Secretary Central Hudson Gas & Electric Corp.

The mid-year meeting of the Executive Committee was held October 3rd and 4th at Software AG headquarters in Reston, Virginia. A summary of the important issues covered in that meeting follows. Additional detail or explanation is available from the Secretary upon request.

This summary contains some significant milestones. It is presented in random order and in no way reflects the significance of each topic.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CHANGES

President Wolverton announced the appointment of Tom Bradbury as the new PREDICT Product Representative to replace Jim Kline who could no longer serve.

CONFERENCE PROCEDURES REVIEW & ISSUES

Overall evaluation by attendees indicated that the Nashville conference was very well received. To answer whether popular classes could be repeated, it was pointed out it was difficult to determine popularity until after a class was given making it impossible to reschedule at the conference.

The Speakers' Lounge was a great success and will be expanded in 1986 to be open sooner including the use of 20 minute video on how to give a presentation.

As with every other year, the lack of user presentations was reviewed. It was suggested that each region should be responsible for at least one presentation. Software AG account representatives will be encouraged to follow up on topics covered at these user meetings.

The 1986 International Conference is set for May 11-15th, 1986 at San Diego and although facilities will be tight, they will be functional. The cost will go up for the first time in several years to reflect the rising facilities' costs.

NOMINATIONS/ELECTIONS

It was reported that regional representatives have been contacted for users interested in the 1986 open offices (President, Secretary, NATURAL and PREDICT Product Representatives) but no responses have been received. A list of potential candidates from past years is available and each will be contacted. Anyone interested in running for an open position should contact Ralph Jenks.

Mail balloting will be cut off 2 weeks before the conference.

PRODUCT STATUS & RELEASE SCHEDULES

In general, the integration of the product administration was reviewed. A central function should be provided or some form of hierarchial structure (i.e. if both NATURAL and SUPER NATURAL are available, administration for the former would drive the latter, etc.) to minimize the amount of time devoted to setting up profiles, security, etc. A planning statement on this subject is due at the next session of the Executive Committee.

ADABAS Version 5 and NATURAL Version 2

Currently, ADABAS Version 5 and NATURAL Version 2 are being prepared for initial release to early test installations: NATURAL in the 4th Quarter of 1985 and ADABAS in the first Quarter of 1986.

Owing to the comprehensiveness and complexity of these new versions, Software AG had always assumed that the release process for these systems would be completed in a very careful and controlled manner.

Plans call for installation of both ADABAS and NATURAL in selected sites shortly after having performed in-house testing in Reston. They will continue to expand the testing arena by adding selected environments and sites. By the time of the International Software AG Users' Conference in May, they expect to have presentations from users, describing their experiences with the new versions.

As is well known, Software AG products are of the highest quality in the industry and it is Software AG's intention to preserve that high level of quality by carefully controlling the distribution of the new versions of ADABAS and NATURAL.

The Planning Guide for ADABAS Version 5 is currently available. It contains the most current information on the product at this time.

Plans call for the Planning Guide for ADA-NET, NETWORK, and NATURAL to be available during the first guarter of 1986.

A formal policy statement on the use of the CMP-EXIT feature will be released to SAGGROUP members within the next several weeks. The statement covers the viability of the feature and Software AG's continued support.

PREDICT VERSION 2.0

PREDICT Vers. 2.0 will go into beta test in the latter part of October, 1985 with anticipated release by year end 1985.

COM-PLETE VERSION 4.4

Affected by requirement to support DOS/VSE SP2, COM-PLETE V 4.4 will go into beta test in the 2nd quarter, 1986 with general release of the product in mid 1986. Security and performance monitoring features will be available as separately priced options.

NATURAL CONNECTION 2

The product is currently in beta test and scheduled for release in November 1985.

NEWSLETTER

The delay in delivery of the newsletter for the February, August and November issues plus the cancellation of the April issue were reviewed. The Executive Committee felt that changes made to the Newsletter to make it more comprehensive did not warrant the delays. As President Wolverton indicated, this newsletter is the communication link among SAGGROUP members and Software AG. It must be out on time for each quarter, as scheduled.

To alleviate potential international bottlenecks, each international representative is being mailed the same information as the Software AG affiliate. This information can then be conveyed directly to other users at regional meetings as necessary if not available from the affiliate on a timely basis.

CHANGE/ENHANCEMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

C/E's from September 1984 through June 1985 have been submitted to Software AG for review and reponses should be available by the 4th quarter, 1985. As with all conversions to new systems, the change has caused initial delays in the turnaround between Software AG and Marty Henderson, the Change/Enhancement Coordinator. Alterations were made and the process should function more smoothly in the coming months. PREDICT will be handled as a separate product for the first time.

TECHNICAL SUPPORT COMMITTEE REPORT

As you can determine from later topics, the results of the 1984 survey have had a dramatic impact on Software AG. The most highly recorded comment by the respondents to the survey was documentation. Although twice as many users responded than in previous years, the overall total represents less than ½ of all users.

The survey for 1985 will be distributed in January 1986. Be sure to complete the document and return it to Roy Richardson as soon as possible. The results really do have an impact on Software AG response and direction. Making your feelings known is integral to the success of SAGGROUP and this survey is one of the most visible ways of demonstrating your perception of Software AG support and its products.

USER PROFILE SYSTEM

The Software AG/SAGGROUP User Profile System has been in place in the Westchester N. Y. Sales Region for approximately 6 months. Based on results in that area, the systems is being expanded to include the Cleveland, Los Angeles and Houston sales regions. Users requiring information on other sites relative to operating environments, product installations and mixes should contact their Software AG account representative. Information available from the system will be returned to you as soon as possible. Updates to user environmental profiles will be included with SM on new version releases. It is up to each user to keep Software AG informed as to their environmental changes and to use the turnaround document when available.

We have waited a long time for this system; it is now your responsibility to keep it up to date and make use of the information.

SAGGROUP INPUT TO PRODUCT DEVELOPMENT & MARKET STRATEGIES

A group formed in early 1985 to work with Software AG on providing direction for PREDICT resulted in changes in the strategic direction and capabilities of that product. Feedback from Software AG on this direct user involvement in product development was so positive that it was extended to the development of CON-NECT. A meeting on that product was held on Tuesday, October 2nd in Reston.

According to Tom Blondi, Software AG Vice-President, Marketing, several additional work study groups for new products or major revisions to old products, will be formed. The products tentatively sheduled are SUPER NATURAL Vers. 2, NATURAL Vers. 2 and NATURAL/CONNECTION Vers. 2. Participating users will be selected through the SAGGROUP product representatives and may be drawn from appropriate SIGs. Current established groups will continue as required.

DENVER SUPPORT FACILITY

Denver Support personnel attendance at regional meetings has been very well received. Art Burkette explained that technical support representatives are available for repeat visits and that this participation is encouraged. Denver only needs a schedule of the individual regional meetings and their desire for attendance by his staff in order to schedule personnel. Colette Farabaugh will contact each region and asks that Betty Iura, Denver User Interface, be included on each region's mailing list to facilitate scheduling.

The TSOP project is underway and plans include direct user dial-up access to the Technical Support Trouble System. The details as to how it will be done (i.e. service bureau, Watts line etc.) still have to be worked out, but its coming.

PRODUCT TOOLS TAPE

Separate tools tapes will be available for each of the products including PREDICT. Each SAGGROUP product representative will review the status of the tapes contents and will report back as to when an updated version will be available.

In order to keep the cost of the tapes more in line with other vendors and to defray the costs of creation and shipping, especially outside the United States, the cost for each tape has been raised to \$50.00 for inside the U.S. and \$75.00 for delivery outside the U.S.

EDUCATION/DOCUMENTATION

NATURAL

A class in NATURAL ADMINISTRATION is scheduled for November 1985. The course outline was reviewed by the Executive Committee. The curriculum includes topics on basic NATURAL internals and relative efficiencies of code.

The NATURAL course is being updated. Courses for end user training by ASI are scheduled for release in the near future.

PREDICT

A Software AG course in PREDICT and data administration is in beta test and will be available for public presentation in the near future. The material reviewed by the Executive Committee indicates a thorough and comprehensive course on the facilities of this product and the integration with dictionaries concepts, and administration and relationships with ADABAS, NATURAL etc.

COMPUTER BASED TRAINING

A CBT based system for NATURAL developed by Deltak is in beta test. In addition, the system developed by Software AG-CANADA as demonstrated in Nashville, will be available in the near future as a separately priced product.

DOCUMENTATION

As a result of suggestions from the Executive Committee and the results of the 1984 Technical Support Survey, all Software AG product documentation will be rewritten. The goal is for new versions of products to be supported by documentation which is complete, comprehensive and easy to use. Documentation of future products will be integrated with development of the product, since it was reasoned, if a function could not be easily explained, it was probably neither easy to use nor completely functional for the user. In addition, update procedures will be standardized for all products.

The goal of the newly established documentation team at Software AG is to adapt the documentation of the user and his needs; not to force the user to adapt to the system. Products will reflect better internal design to reduce the need but not the level nor availability for end user technical support.

FUTURE OF REGIONAL EDUCATION CAPABILITIES

After a several months delay, regional training facilities in Hasbrouck Heights (New Jersey) and Denver will be available in November, 1985. These sites will feature full classroom and terminal facilities.

REGIONAL REALIGNMENT PROJECT

Overlays of all user sites in North America will be sent by Mike Ater to the North American Area Representative with suggested regional realignments. These will be distributed to each region for comments and review. The final definition of each region will be presented and approved at the San Diego conference in 1986.

It must be noted that the purpose of the realignment is to make regional meetings more convenient for the user and to promote attendance and involvement. The addition of new user sites over the past several years has distorted the concentrations in some geographic areas and left others in remote non-accessible areas. Each user retains the right to attend whichever regional meeting they so desire. Take the opporunity to review the proposed changes and make your feelings known to your regional representatives.

The regional representatives are directed to convey all decisions on this subject to the North American Area Representative at least 6 weeks prior to the next conference.

BUSINESS INDUSTRY GROUPS

At the Nashville Conference, several Business Industry Groups (BIGs) were formed. Of these, only the State and Local Governments BIG other than the previously formed College and University BIG has become active.

We know you're out there. In order to provide support, guidance and direction, SAGGROUP must know who the chairpersons are including any support offices that have been filled. Each BIG leader is requested to forward a list of their groups organization and membership to Robert Shaw, SAGGROUP Vice-President and Larry Jayne, Software AG User Liaison as soon as possible. The future of the BIG movement is in your hands.

SPECIAL INTEREST GROUPS

As with BIGs, the chairpersons of each Special Interest Group (SIGs) have not provided membership lists nor the identity of their vice-chairpersons. This information is important in the event an individual must step down. Please forward the data to the individual product representatives and/or the SAGGROUP Secretary.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Several amendments to the SAGGROUP Constitution were proposed in the Executive Committee session, primarily to clarify certain items in the current Constitution and simplify the wording. An amendment package will be distributed to each licensed site in early 1986. Please review the items and return your votes as soon as possible.
